Mission

The Chula Vista Promise Neighborhood (CVPromise) brings together a collaboration of partners focused on family, education, health, and community to support academic excellence and college-bound aspirations for all children in Chula Vista's Castle Park community. Led by South Bay Community Services (SBCS), CVPromise's collaborative partners serve the community with a vital early learning network, research-based and data-driven academic interventions, and family supports. Over the next 20 years, CVPromise expects to scale up its efforts to serve 122,350 children in the South Bay region of San Diego County.

Early Results

- Connected 6,890 residents to resources and services and increased community volunteerism by 36-fold through our Promotora Model.
- Provided 40 youth and 43 adults a comprehensive employment readiness training and all have completed the program.
- Enrolled 216 middle and high school students with 81 percent of these seniors applying to colleges and universities and 27 receiving early acceptance through the Academic Advocate program.
- Increase in the number of children in early learning settings (center and/or home-based care) from 43 percent in 2012 to 59 percent in 2013.
- Increase in parental engagement as measured by percentage of parents who read to their children (birth to kindergarten) three or more times per week from 53 percent in 2012 to 68 percent in 2013.





Community Served

Chula Vista's Castle Park neighborhood covers 33 census blocks in San Diego County, and has a population of 6,744. Located six miles from the U.S.-Mexico border, Castle Park has a large immigrant population, high poverty, and high unemployment. Fifty-eight percent of students at Castle Park schools are English language learners, 62 percent of pre-kindergarten age children do not attend preschool, and 67 percent of adults have not graduated from high school.
